

PRAXIS 2023: ADVANCING MALAYSIA'S STRATEGIC INTERESTS

WELCOMING REMARKS BY PROFESSOR DR MOHD FAIZ ABDULLAH CHAIRMAN, INSTITUTE OF STRATEGIC & INTERNATIONAL STUDIES (ISIS) MALAYSIA

24 OCTOBER 2023 HILTON KUALA LUMPUR

Yang Berhormat Dato' Sri Hajah Nancy Shukri, Minister of Women, Family and Community Development,

Excellencies, distinguished panellists and delegates,

Ladies and gentlemen,

Assalamu'alaikum warrahmatulahhi wabarakatuh, selamat pagi, good morning!

- 1. It gives me great pleasure to welcome you to the PRAXIS 2023 Conference and I look forward to meeting you over the course of the day!
- 2. At ISIS Malaysia, our primary mission is to provide indepth research, analyses and policy proposals on



strategic <u>international</u> and <u>domestic</u> issues that affect the vital interests of the nation.

- 3. On the international front, we organised the 36th APR in August to discuss great power rivalry, the evolution of the Indo-Pacific, and regional political developments, among many other topics pertinent to the stability of the region. I am pleased to share that this was well received by both Malaysian delegates and those from abroad.
- 4. Our work on the domestic front centres on PRAXIS, which is our flagship domestic-focused conference guided by the central tenet of translating theory into practice. As a policy-oriented think tank, what this means is that the pursuit of knowledge and the comprehension of various theories and concepts must be applied and oriented towards policy solutions.
- 5. In this regard, those from the research community will be keenly aware and appreciative that this cannot be done in a vacuum, locked away, separate and in silo from the wider policymaking community. Rather, we know that policy research must be consultative. It must be multistakeholder to reflect the multifaceted challenges facing our country. Above all, our proposals must be pragmatic, actionable and aligned



with the needs and aspirations of the people and the nation.

- 6. In conceptualising this year's PRAXIS, the team and I had set our sights on being more ambitious. We wanted to go above and beyond organising just another conference. We wanted to ensure that we execute our mandate to provide critical thoughts and articulate our positions to best advance Malaysia's strategic interests.
- 7. To that end, we began by reaching out to four leading voices to guide our work for PRAXIS this year, and it is through their abled stewardship, we are here today. These leading voices, thought leaders, and experts within their various fields were engaged as lead experts to guide our work on food security, the care economy, semiconductors, and climate resilience.
- 8. While Oscar Wilde has proclaimed that the only thing to do with good advice is to pass it on, Confucius reminds us that real knowledge is to know the extent of our ignorance.
- Nevertheless, Immanuel Kant in his *Kritik der Reinen Vernunft* - The Critique of Pure Reason – would appear to have the last word on this: "All our knowledge begins with the senses, proceeds then to the understanding, and ends with reason."



- 10. So, in this vein, I would like to extend ISIS Malaysia's profound appreciation to Professor Emeritus Tan Sri Zakri Abdul Hamid, Professor Datuk Dr Norma Mansor, Dr Sharbanom Abu Bakar, and Dr Larry Wong for sharing their time, experience, and knowledge with us.
- 11. Further to this, the team and I decided to expand the work that we do before and after the PRAXIS Conference. In the months that led to this day, we organised multistakeholder roundtables to identify the most pertinent issues associated with those four topics. These issues were then mapped accordingly, in order to formulate the design of today's four sessions, where we will be deliberating over possible policy solutions.
- 12. At this juncture, I would like to thank the roundtable participants for your buy-in into the PRAXIS process. Your insights on these various issues helped shape today's programme and our work moving forward.
- 13. Following today's conference, the policy solutions put forward by our esteemed panellists will be compiled, along with our internal research and analyses, to produce policy briefs that will be distributed to all stakeholders. These briefs will be succinct in form, and actionable and pragmatic in substance – and we



trust that this will move the needle forward for better policy solutions for the country.

Distinguished delegates,

- 14. This year's theme, "Advancing Malaysia's Strategic Interests", was selected after much deliberation. We believe that it is apt and timely to capture today's zeitgeist, wherein we celebrated the 60th anniversary of Malaysia's formation against a backdrop of emerging challenges.
- 15. This includes a challenging global economy, uncertain geostrategic landscape, climate disasters, food insecurity and domestic demographic shifts. These challenges can threaten to throw nations off their development pathways, especially ones with an open-trading economy like Malaysia.
- 16. It is with that imperative that we identified the four focus areas for this year: food security, the care economy, the semiconductor ecosystem, and the transition towards a nature-positive economy.
- 17. It is self-evident that at this inflection point of our development journey, we can ill afford inaction and business-as-usual approaches cannot guarantee continued gains. PRAXIS 2023 thus represents a collective endeavour to deliberate on these key areas



and design solutions towards advancing Malaysia's strategic interests.
